The guest speaker for the Academic Assembly was Dr Rohan Brunello. Dr Brunello is an old boy of the College, having attended Padua from 1985 through until his graduation in 1992. After completing a Bachelor of Applied Science specialising in Human Movement Studies in 1997 at the University of Queensland, he then went on to graduate with a Bachelor of Medicine and Surgery in 2001, graduating with Honours. In 2010, Dr Brunello awarded a Fellow of the Royal Australian College of Surgeons in Orthopedics and has been awarded clinical fellowships in both the United Kingdom and the United States. He is currently in private practice at the Wesley Orthopaedic Clinic and visits the Royal Brisbane and The Prince Charles Hospitals as a visiting Specialist. During his time at the College, Dr

Brunello was a keen sportsman who was selected as an Australian and Queensland U17 Rugby League Representative in 1993, as a Queensland Students Rugby League Representative in 1995 and as a Queensland Metropolitan Rugby Union Representative in 1996. # The annual Old Boys V First XI cricket match

The annual Old Boys V First XI cricket match took place on the 14<sup>th</sup> of March this year in a 20:20 format. This played into the hands of the ever aging and fatiguing Old Boys. Recruitment Officer and old Boys stalwart, Scott Maguire (1989) drafted well this year and made the tactical decision to move himself to the bench. He enlisted fellow 1989 Senior, Chris Holding with a wealth of experience on the cricket field along with some young blood in Samson Lowney (2013), Jonathan Knight (2009), Dave Longhurst (2009), Chris O'Shea (1994), Anthony Hoiberg (1995) and Chris Humphreys (1996).

As per tradition the Old Boys opted to bat first with Chris Holding and Frank DePasquale (1979) leading the team out at a run a ball till the 6<sup>th</sup> over. Some tight bowling and a few tactical field changes saw a few quick wickets and some tight overs in the middle dragging the Old Boys to 5/74 after 13 overs. This bought Marty Raadschelders (1997) and Jonathan Knight to the crease and with some hefty hitting (three 6s & eight 4s between them) and quick running to put a quick 69 more on the board. At the end of the 20 overs a respectable 7/154 had been reached.

The very confident First XI started well with Captain, Reece Andrews and fellow opener, Tom Allison putting on a 63 run partnership. This was confidently followed by Stephen Gill taking the First XI to 3/110 after 13 overs. However experience and some skill by the Old Boys saw Anthony Hoiberg snare Stephen Gill with a quick stumping and Chris O'Shea taking a Fatty Vautin esk catch to turn the tide leaving the First XI at 8/149 after 18 overs. Needing just 6 off the last 2 overs Samson Lowney spun some magic and dismissed their 9<sup>th</sup> batsmen and followed up the final over with a run out from the boundary leaving the First XI 1 run short.

The excited Old Boys celebrated the win with a few drinks and pizza post match, with many of the games heroics and stories of yester-year getting more indulgent by the minute.


# Congratulations



**NOTES TO PARENTS**

**SPORT** Every pupil in the College is expected to take his part in the sporting life of the College, and to be prepared to do his duty to the full when given the honour of representation in any sporting activity. Of course, if it is considered that emphasis on sport is likely to prejudice scholastic success, a curtailment of sporting activities in an individual case will certainly be considered.

**SPIRIT OF STUDY**—At Padua a boy is expected to apply himself to study without undue pressure from teacher or parent. It is an important part of a boy's training that as soon as possible he should be brought to realise that his future is in his own hands; the best opportunities may be wasted through lack of application and perseverance.

**CLASS HOURS**—Classes commence at 9 a.m., and terminate at 3.30 p.m. During the day there are two recesses: 11.00 to 11.20 and another of one hour at 12.30 p.m.

**ATTENDANCE AND PUNCTUALITY**—Regular attendance and punctuality are of the highest importance, and in the case of unavoidable absence the Teacher in charge of the class should be notified.

## The 1958

The B's were the heroes of the school. This team played throughout the season without suffering a defeat—see team photo opposite. Fifth grade celebrated the end of the season with a "cessus" party.

A few players were F. Rondeau, B. Deever, and M. Longhurst. For the B's I. O'Hara, R. McQueen and M. O'Keara were recognized as the best players.

The following are the exact results of the matches played. A team versus Rosalie: 3-3; v. St. Columban's: 6-1; v. Shorncliffe: 3-0; v. St. Lawrence's: 0-12; v. Ashgrove: 3-3; v. St. James's: 12-0; v. Nudgee Junior: 0-6; v. De La Salle: 8-0; v. Gregory Terrace: 2-6.

The victorious B team drew in their match against Rosalie: v. St. Columban's: 6-3; v. Shorncliffe: 12-0; v. St. Lawrence's: 6-3; v. Ashgrove: 25-0; v. St. James's: 6-1; v. Gregory Terrace: 17-2; v. Nudgee Junior: 17-0.

**Grade VI:** In football Sixth Grade boys did their best and as long as they play the game irrespective of a win or a loss they are learning true sportsmanship.

Two teams played the season. P. Stark and W. Williamson were Captain and Vice-captain respectively for A team. The best players for the team were M. Sims, W. Williamson and P. McElroy. The team only won one game and that was against Ashgrove with a score of 8 to 11.

In the other matches A team did not score a point and were defeated by Rosalie: 2-0; St. Columban's: 5; St. Patrick's: 3; St. James's: 22; Nudgee Junior: 28.

The captaincy of B team slightly bothered the results of A team. A. Cordin was captain and M. Folis was Vice-captain. In six matches played the B team won two matches. The results of matches are recorded:

**Grade VII:** The following is exactly what one of the boys from Seventh Grade says of the football season: "The football this year was not as good as it could have been, but we must make allowances. Most of the schools our teams played were already well established, while ours is still comparatively young."

"The first game against Rosalie turned out to be a complete disaster owing to Paul McGuire's A team, but the B team, captained by Selby Simpson, kept their opponents at bay for a time. The second match against St. Columban's was a complete whitewash."

as far as Padua was concerned. Again, in the next match against Ashgrove, A team lost outright, but the B team showed a little promise by making their first try of the season, although they were still beaten by six points.

Both teams were utterly defeated by Shorncliffe the week after, but Padua wasn't going to take this sitting down. The following week, against Scarborough, A team actually (given the atrocious conditions) scored a try and "convincingly"—and were beaten by only 4 points. After this the A team again scored a try, but it was hopeless. They were beaten 31-3 by Nudgee Junior. The following week B team made a come-back, and again scored a try, but in spite of their valiant effort they were beaten by St. James. "Although Padua did not win one game this season, but as I said before you cannot expect much from a comparatively young school."



## The Banyo Playing Fields

As part of our continuing endeavour to keep the history of Columban's alive, the Association consulted Old Boy and long-time Brisbane resident, Joel Fleming about the history of the Elliott Road site. Joel's family has a long and dedicated history to the area and he provided the following information.

The Banyo playing fields land was part of an original 150 acre holding, extending the entire length of Elliott Road, owned by Mr Joseph Francis Fleming and his wife Sheila, who lived in their family home on the property with their nine children for many years. They bought the property from Nudgee College after selling their Scarborough property to Monsignor Frawley who built De La Salle College on that land.

The Brothers from StC visited the Fleming home one evening in the early 1960's to discuss the matter of sporting grounds for the College at Elliott Rd. StC bought the land and developed it into their playing fields, which were the scene of many memorable sporting events. StC subsequently sold the grounds to Padua College.

Joe Fleming was a grandson of Thomas and Catherine Fleming who came to Brisbane from Ireland on 'The Golden Dream' in 1863 and were early settlers of the Nudgee district. The Courier Mail of Friday 28 April 1899 published an Obituary for Mr Thomas Fleming, referring to him as a pilgrim father of Queensland. It read in part that the departed gentleman was held in special esteem by the late R.C. Bishop of Brisbane and by the good Sisters of Mercy of All Hallows and St Vincent's, who also held him in like-valued estimation.

It was reported that not only Mr Thomas Fleming's large family, but also all fellow-colonists, knew the sterling worth of the man. He was described as leaving 'a legacy of character, conduct, and industry, in which they and those coming after may share an honest and noble pride.'

A truly remarkable history of a place that has strong and undeniable links to StC!

Bro Con Moloney, with the assistance of Bro Marshall, must be acknowledged as being instrumental in the building of the Banyo Playing Fields.



**Editor:** In 1998 Padua purchased the 7.2 hectares at Elliott Street, Banyo from the Catholic Archdiocese of Brisbane, that was because when the Christian Brothers left St Columban's College, all that College's property was left to the Archdiocese.

## Primary Armidale Rugby Competition

WINS: The Junior Highlanders swept the competition at the TAS Rugby Carnival last weekend.

### Young Highlanders top ten at TAS

Over 100 boys aged between 10-13 representing five different junior academies travelled to The Armidale TAS Rugby Carnival last weekend. In its 10th consecutive year the junior tournament has been staged, and saw over 1000 senior rugby players throughout NSW and Queensland compete in a mix of major sports: boarding schools, rugby clubs, and local junior rugby clubs. It included everyone. It was a control held two days and the boys were provided accommodation and meals overnight. Invited judges were among the adjudicators who decided the year's junior Highlanders best. The Junior Highlanders beat the Henders Anglican College from the QLD 12-6 in the tournament final, which followed by a second place in a second game against St Patrick's, Maitland 24-5. The results now are: junior

Highlanders ended with four best country honours before their final match which they lost to the eventual winners The King's School Sydney.

A pre-game speech by Coach Greg Farrelly had the boys firing, and they demonstrated throughout the match, both attack and defence.

The Invocell boys were unable to stop King's but managed some fine passes on King's but were unable to score as the full-time bell to come out sounded.

However, the junior Highlanders were able to defend King's coaching staff's demands that a draw would have been a better option than a defeat due to all the effort put in during the game.

Holding lifted their spirits. The Highlanders were poised for the final Sunday game against the Queensland Baby Waratahs, which contained an old friend in Robby Kelly.

They dominated play and won the much-needed trophy of third against 45.

12 resulted in them being ranked in 4th place in the competition, with 11th place going to the Armidale Padua College, Armidale.

Unfortunately the Padua boys were a little more dejected, and Highlanders could not fight off 19-7 defeat.

In a commendable show of sportsmanship throughout the month, junior coach and former OLRFC player and administrator Xavier Sandbeck, advised the referee he had not awarded the ball after being awarded a try. The disciplinary unit reviewed, and Sandbeck was acknowledged by Padua, with clapped his hand to a man.

Invocell Junior Highlanders were the only non-school based team to do not win an achievement.

The boys only completed two training runs and were up against teams that have trained in boarding schools for months, however, their raw talent and enthusiasm has been playing in equal terms.

## GRANDAD WOULD BE PROUD AS YOUNGSTER STICKS WITH LEAGUE

THE grandson of Kangaroos great Lionel Williamson has rejected AFL and rugby union to honour his heritage.

The Broncos have won the scrap for Lindsay Collins' signature and his hype was justified when he started for the Queensland under-18 team in their victory NSW last Wednesday.

A mauler in AFL and a flanker in union, Collins, 18, stands 180cm tall and already weighs 95kg.

His size, natural talent and work ethic saw him sought after by three codes but ultimately hooker won out.

Collins' grandfather is the original Ipswich Flyer, Lionel Williamson.

Williamson was a silky winger who carved up the冲fields of Ipswich half a century before Billy Slater.

Williamson played first grad for the Newtown Jets in Sydney.

He also starred for Queensland and Australia, scoring two tries in their 1988

World Cup final victory over France.

He now coaches league at Cairns high school St Augustine's College.

His legacy is what tipped the articulate Collins to stay with the 13-man code in the face of interest from the Lions and Australian Rugby Union.

"I represented Queensland in rugby and was then selected in a national gold squad with the Australian Rugby Union," Collins said.

"I was also asked to come down for a Brisbane Lions rookie camp."

"I had some options but I have been playing league since I was a little kid and my grandad represented Queensland and Australia and he still coaches the game."

"I just grew up with league. I have been following the Brumbies since I was young."

"It was good to play all sports in school but mate, league is in my heart and I just want to have a crack at it."

A Padua College student and Brisbane Brothers junior, Collins was signed to the Broncos at age 16 but continues playing rugby union for his high school and dabbling in Aussie rules.

Collins is now a fixture in the Broncos' under-20 team, impressing at prop and in the second row.

The Broncos have signed several teenage rugby union stars in the past 18 months, including Collins and the highly touted Jack Puttle.

The lure of being paid to play sport in their first year out of high school is tempting more teens to choose league.

"The under-20s level in league is really good for developing players too," Collins said.

"You are playing against the best, guys your age and it makes you better."

## Film sheds light on depression

WHEN a group of QUT students decided to create a film on depression, what surprised them most was not how many Brisbane identities signed on to the project – but how deeply the issue affected those who appear to have a perfect life in the public eye.

Student Andrew Cripps, who has experienced depression and anxiety, wanted to do a film project to help others.

Within days of roping in friend and fellow student Nicolas Laube, the B105 Abby, Stav and Labby breakfast team had come on board, and Channel 9 was showing interest.

Two months after the project started, media stars, athletes such as Australia's leading water skier Joel Howley, X Factor identities and musicians such as band Violent Soho were all on board, with a number of high profile identities also taking notice.

Mr Laube said while the 10-minute film would intertwine Mr Cripps' experiences with celebrities providing messages of support, it was the personal sto-

ries they told off-camera that were most revealing.

## Year 12 Mooting



On the 2<sup>nd</sup> of May, three aspiring legal eagles, year 12 students, Heath Gabbett, Daniel McLindon and Tyler Stosic took part in the Bond University Mooting Competition. With impressive prizes on offer (\$100 000 Bond University scholarship) the boys embraced the opportunity to learn more about working within the legal system with great enthusiasm. The team had been given a hypothetical legal case along with the relevant statutes and precedent cases. The case involved a 15 year old boy, who had broken his neck while swinging from a rope into a river at a Council event. The Padua boys were asked to represent this fictitious client and to prove that the Council had breached its duty of care.

After preparing their case for about two months, it was time for the boys to compete. They arrived at the Commonwealth Law Courts building in the city, and were shocked by the cold environment of the Courts. Their nerves started to kick in as they waited just outside their hearing room. The judge soon called the boys in to begin their moot. Heath Gabbett as Senior Counsel addressed the Court first, assisted by Junior Counsel Daniel McLindon and instructing solicitor, Tyler Stosic. One unique element of mooting is the constant interruption by the judge, and the conversational tone of speech that is expected. The boys spoke well under pressure, maintaining their composure and responding well to the judges' questions.

One particularly memorable response was from Daniel McLindon who reminded the bemused Judge that 'a fifteen year-old isn't exactly the epitome of human reasoning.' While they weren't given a result on the day (winners of the Brisbane heat are announced at a later date), the judges were very positive about the research and advocacy skills of the Padua students who are hopeful of progressing to the next round of the State-wide competition.
