Dear Paduans,

Mr Robert Out at the end of this year completes his 16 year tenure as the first lay Rector of Padua College. When he graduated from the University of Queensland, he was offered a position at Padua, where he had been a student. So after many years as teacher, he became Vice-Rector, then with the retirement of Fr John Boyd-Boland in 2000, he began his term as Rector.

Not long after his appointment the College began a new and significant building phase, with the opening of "La Cordelle" as a Assembly Hall, sports complex and venue for liturgical ceremonies. The Saint Bonaventure Resource was opened at 2006, and houses the Assisi Library, Seminar Rooms and the Teaching and Learning offices. Later La Foresta garden and fountain was built at the rear of Saint Francis Hall.



More recently the four storey Santa Croce complex was completed. It comprises, in air-conditioned comfort, space for Science Rooms, Music, the Performing Arts, and Visual Arts, as well as space for receptions and gatherings. Earlier this year the 'Greccio Dome' was completed, this is a wet weather cover for basket ball/tennis courts on the Greccio campus.

More importantly, Mr Out has involved the College in "The Leuven Project" on Enhancing Catholic School Identity Project, so to maximise the Catholic and Franciscan identity of the school. Padua has much to thank Mr. Out for: his quiet and unassuming mindfulness, and the overall servant - care he has shown to the boys and staff will be much missed.

The Leuven Project

Last year Padua College entered into an agreement with the Catholic University of Leuven (Belgium) on Enhancing Catholic School Identity Project. After successfully completing a survey with staff, students and parents, as well as examining the school's policy documents, the university gave Padua feed-back on its catholic school identity. It reported Padua as a strong faith community. They presented data, which has given the college a template for further enhancing its catholic identity. This in the areas of teacher professional development, student learning, and opportunities for the Catholic faith and tradition to be better understood and appreciated.

Mr. Michael O'Brien, Vice Rector, Formation recently spent two weeks in Leuven together with teachers from other Queensland Catholic schools. He will be driving this project at Padua working closely with old boy **Simon Mahaffy (OB 1998)** from Brisbane Catholic Office. A small working party of staff has been set up at Padua, and it will proceed in terms of recommendations put forward by the University of Leuven.

Jim Doherty has been a close mate of mine since we first met in Grade 3 at St Anthony's Primary School Kedron. Back then, Jim's large family had just arrived in Australia after emigrating from Ireland. On his first day at school our teacher, Sister Mary Pacifica, sat him down beside me, telling me to look after the new boy. Jim was a tough little character, and he soon let me know that he didn't need any looking after.

When we advanced into Grade 4, the boys and girls were segregated, and the boys were sent to Padua Boys' School, later called Padua College, next door to St Anthony's.



I had volunteered for National Service when I was still 18 years old. At the completion of three months' recruit training followed by three months' Infantry Corps training at the Third Training Battalion Singleton New South Wales, I was posted to Fourth Battalion Royal Australian Regiment (4RAR) at Enoggera Barracks. When 4RAR arrived in Vietnam, we were joined by two companies of Kiwis and became 4RAR/NZ (Anzac) Battalion. In July 1969, my two-year stint in the army came to an end. During that time, I had spent 12 months with 4RAR/NZ at the two-way firing range called Vietnam.

Jim Doherty was at the Third Training Battalion completing his Infantry Corps training when I arrived home from Vietnam.

In August 1969, Jim came home for his seven days' pre-embarkation leave. Whenever I wasn't at work, I spent all my spare time with him. During that time, I gave Jim my one and only piece of advice: "Jim, when I was out in the jungle, I saw hundreds of bullet scars on trees. I soon noticed that most of the bullet scars were above knee-height. So, Jim, when the shooting starts hug the ground and stay down low."

In September 1969, Jim was posted as a reinforcement to 6RAR/NZ: the battalion that had replaced my battalion, 4RAR/NZ, four months previously. Jim spent nearly nine months in Vietnam as a forward scout.

Pete Kowalski joined Jim and me at Padua College at the start of high school. Four years later, in 1965, we finished Senior (Year 12), at which time Pete and I joined the Commonwealth Bank. Pete and I were partners in the first car we ever owned: a 1954 Vauxhall Tourer. It cost us 25 Pounds (\$50). I already had my driver's licence, and I gave Pete his first driving lessons in the Vauxhall.

After Jim, Pete and I finished school in 1965, we spent most of our free time together: playing Rugby League, tinkering with our cars and going to the monthly 60/40 dance at the hall next to the Little Flower Church Kedron.

Pete was also called-up for National Service. At the completion of Infantry Corps training, Pete was made a machine -gunner in 2RAR which was stationed at Lavarack Barracks in Townsville.

In April 1970, I was saying goodbye to Pete at Brisbane Airport. Pete had been home on seven days' preembarkation leave and was returning to 2RAR in Townsville. Pete's battalion was about to relieve Jim's battalion in Vietnam. During his period of leave, I gave Pete the same piece of advice that I had given to Jim: when the shooting starts hug the ground and stay down low. Although I knew Pete would face many hardships and dangers throughout the next 12 months, I fully expected him to return home to us alive.

Pete's battalion didn't sail to Vietnam aboard HMAS Sydney as I had. Instead, 2RAR was flown to Vietnam in company groups of 150 Diggers at four-day intervals on chartered Qantas Boeing 707s. The 6RAR Diggers returned to Australia on the same aircraft.

On May 12, 1970, Pete's company arrived in Vietnam. Jim was still at the Aussie base at Nui Dat when Pete arrived, so they were able to spend some time together, and Jim got to meet some of Pete's mates.

On May 16, 1970, the last arriving company of 2RAR replaced the last departing company—Jim's company—of 6RAR, and Jim flew home on a Qantas Boeing 707. When he arrived home, Jim was due for one month's leave but then had to go to Lavarack Barracks in Townsville to join up with the rest of 6RAR to complete his time as a national serviceman.

In January 1971, Jim was discharged from the army and returned to Brisbane. By that time, Pete had completed about eight months of his year-long tour, and we were all looking forward to his return home.

On February 9, 1971, Jim phoned me with the tragic news that Pete had been killed the day before. Pete's body was returned to Australia about a week later, and Jim asked me to go with him to view the body at the funeral parlour. Pete's body was lying in a casket. Part of the lid of the casket was left open to allow visitors to view Pete's body from the chest up. The funeral director explained that a mine explosion had killed Pete, and both his legs were missing.

On February 20, 1971, Pete was buried at the Nudgee Catholic Cemetery. As his coffin was slowly lowered into the grave, I remembered with sadness the well-meant advice I had once given to Pete: when the shooting starts hug the ground and stay down low. Frustratingly, I knew that none of those useless words could have protected Pete from the horror of a mine explosion.



Author's note: Out of the twenty-five students in the Class of 1965, six were conscripted into National Service; five served in Vietnam.





First student returns for diamond jubilee in Kedron Padua College celebrations

SCHOOL days were exactly 60 years ago, but Padua College's first student admits he's never left the community.

Michael Stark, 71, walked through the gates of Padua College in Kedron in 1956, becoming the school's first enrolled student.

school's first enrolled student.
"They were the best years of my life," he said.
So good, he and younger brother Peter Stark,
who started Year 4 in 1956 and returned to teach
at Padua College after university, chose to grow old with the adjoining Franciscan community as lay parishioners.

We haven't left really," Peter Stark, 69, said. "I spent two years in Rockhampton playing football, came back here and worked at Padua.
"Working back into here was fantastic."
"We still come to Mass here," Michael Stark

Both brothers excelled in sports at the college,

heading triumphant wins against competing Catholic schools on Brisbane's north.

Despite leaving the school in Grade 10 to finish their senior years at Kedron State High School, the Stark name has "stuck around" at Padua College.

"I've got four grandsons here now," Peter Stark said.

"My sons, four boys, went to Padua, and two of my sons have boys in here.

ister general Fr Michael Perry.










Gerard Sammon (OB 1979)

1956 2016 Dear Parents,

I hope that the Easter Break was a relaxing time with family and friends and that you are refreshed for the rigours of Term 2.

I was privileged over this holidays to spend time in the company of 57 students on their European Rugby Tour. I am sure that you will be able to read full accounts of this trip in other reports, but for me, there were three highlights. The first was the behavior and attitude of the boys on tour. They were a pleasure to be with displaying a significant level of maturity in recognizing that they needed to contribute to a great tour through their cooperation and responsibility.

The second highlight was finding the grave of Robert Sutton on the Somme Battlefields. Robert Sutton is the great, great uncle of Daniel Whittaker. Having the close connection to one of our tourists added significant poignancy to our tour of the battlefields, setting the scene for many of our tourists for ANZAC Day commemorations.





The final highlight for the tour was meeting up with Tom O'Toole and his family in Belfast. Tom was a student at Padua from 2009 until last year. His older brothers also attended Padua. The family decided to return to Ireland last year and Tom attended Campbell College in Belfast. Tom played a significant role in the undefeated First XV Premiership last year and has continued his rugby in Ireland, being selected in the Under 18 Irish Schoolboys team this year. Tom asked to speak to the tourists after their game against Methodist College. He paid tribute to Padua for all of the opportunities the school had given him and

acknowledged the value of all of the friendships he had made whilst at Padua. He then presented his Irish Under 18 jersey to the school. It was quite a moving moment on the tour. The jersey will be framed and kept at the school. Tom is our second rugby international. The other is Dominic Maguire who played for the Wallabies in 1989/90, representing his country on 13 occasions.

Also over the holidays, Padua held Rugby and Football clinics, attended an Open Football Carnival and went to the Armidale School Rugby Carnival. Many thanks to the teachers and staff who helped organize these opportunities for the boys.

Today, the boys experience their annual ANZAC commemoration. The ceremony was very good, made more so by the presence of seven Vietnam 'Old Boys'. Sam Sammartinio presented an excellent speech, which will be reproduced in the Paduan at the end of the year.

Bulletin 3 2016 Bob Out

Last Tuesday (16 February) was a very special occasion for Padua College, as we celebrated the 60th Inaugural Mass. What was so significant was that the Mass was concelebrated by Archbishop Mark Coleridge, the Minister General of the Franciscans, Fr Michael Perry ofm and the Provincial Minister Fr Paul Smith ofm. Also present was Fr Gregory Redoblado ofm, the General Definitor for the Franciscans in Oceania.

During his homily, Archbishop Mark spoke passionately about the relevance of St Francis and St Anthony to Padua College and its students. He encouraged the students to incorporate the greeting of St Francis, 'pax et bonum' (peace and good things) into their lives and make it true for those that they meet.

At the special school assembly that followed the Mass, Fr Michael Perry began his address with

a music video 'Remedy' by Adele. He also delivered a message from Pope Francis to the Padua Community. He went on to present the College with a Tau Cross made of olive wood from the surrounds of San Damiano and he also presented the College with a special Franciscan medallion. Both of these presentations are being set up for display in the College foyer. Additionally, Fr Michael imparted a special 'Seraphic Blessing' upon the College community, which was recorded on a certificate, once again to be displayed in the foyer. The official part of the visit concluded with the blessing of the Greccio Sports Courts (Grecciodome) by Fr Michael. All in all, the 60th Inaugural Mass and visit by the Minister General was a very auspicious day for the boys to witness.



Last week, we also held the annual House Swimming Carnivals. They were fiercely competitive events with exuberant cheering from all Houses. Congratulations to Mitchell House on their win. Fr Alban would have been proud.



Last Monday, I represented Padua College at the funeral of Fr Tom Murtagh ofm. Fr Tom first came to Padua College as a teacher from 1967 until 1969. He was then appointed as the Rector of the College from 1970 until 1972. After a brief hiatus, during which he taught at Daramalan College in Canberra, Fr Tom returned to teach at Padua from 1974 until 1977. Fr Tom joined the friars in 1953 and was ordained a priest in 1960. Whilst at Padua, he taught Maths and Science and, after leaving Padua, studied at St Bonaventure University in New York. When he returned to Australia he taught at the Yarra Theological Union, Melbourne. Fr Tom suffered a serious stroke in 2005 and passed away on the 15th February 2016. We pray that Fr Tom rests in God's loving embrace and that his family experiences some comfort and peace in their grief.




Do you remember the old tennis courts at the Primary school (Greccio campus)? Here is the new sports facility on that spot...fondly known as the 'Greccio dome'
