### The Good Men of Padua

This week, a group of staff including Fr John, Fr Paul and Fr Mario met with Brother Damian Price. Br Damian's work is around service learning. More specifically, he focuses on how schools can create learning experiences that make a difference to the students' world view, value systems and

enable them to be 'agents of change' in our world. Our task was to consider how we deliver upon the words of our website, strategic plan and mission statement when we talk about the 'Good Men of Padua.' In essence, we were trying to make sense of all the experiences our boys have during their time at the College and how these experiences link to the mission of Padua College. What is it that we do to ensure that there is purpose in our work, so that when our young men graduate, they fully understand what it means to be joyous, humble, courteous, peaceful and to live simply?

We spoke at length about the various learning experiences at Padua, both in the classroom and outside, and how they shape these values. While it is a big undertaking, we sometimes need to take a step back and look at the big picture. We can at times be drawn to it doing things without thought as to how they fit with our broader mission.

In the time of St Francis, the castle walls were often adorned with huge tapestries, which were basically woven pictures of daily scenes, significant historical events or significant events. They didn't just do this for decoration. They did it more as a form of communication, but as a statement around what was important to society. They didn't have the internet, newspapers or books, they used art and tapestries to represent what was important to their time. More so, they didn't have schools, strategic plans or annual action plans.

At our assembly this week we celebrated and acknowledged a number of things, you may even describe the collection as a tapestry of our work.

1. Prayer for women – St Clare and Mary MacKillop.
2. Academic Awards – remaining presentations left over from students, mainly Year 10, who were absent last assembly.
3. Greccio Book Week Parade next week- encouraging reading.
4. Junior/Senior Debating, Public Speaking, UN Presentations.
5. Science Week Teachers v Students Quiz Championship Round.
6. Year 9 RE Social Action Unit and announcement of Casual Dress Day for Farmers next week.
7. FCIP Senior Big Band playing 3 songs throughout the assembly program – In recognition of their involvement in the Catholic College's Music Festival.
8. Sport – House Carnival, Cross Country Wrap Up, Launch 2018 Track and Field Season.

This diverse list of activities highlights the broad offerings at Padua. However, being busy and doing lots, is not in itself the aim. What is important is how the things we do link to the values we want our boys to leave Padua with. On assembly, I asked the boys to consider being like the artist in the Middle Ages and having to create the tapestry to adorn the walls of La Cordelle. What would they include in their artwork to reflect the College's values? Making sure that our work is linked to our mission means that our work has meaning and purpose. Notwithstanding this challenge, we are blessed that we have such a wonderful charism and set of values to guide us in our work.

### Year 12 Formal

Congratulations to Year 12 on their Formal on Tuesday evening. It was a pleasure to speak to parents about the ways our boys presented and behaved on the evening. As I said to the boys, while the night was a significant one in their Year 12 journey,

it was equally a significant night for parents and staff. It was great to see the proud looks on parents' faces as they watched their sons enter the venue. I thank the staff who attended the evening and in particular the organising committee of Mrs Lisa Farry, Mrs Renae Bowman, Mrs Sue Weston and Mr Ben Lowrie, as well as the student organising committee.

## The Chaplain



The second of our Paduan Franciscan values that underpin all we do at Padua is COURTESY.

In the world-view of St Francis courtesy was linked with what went on in a court of law or in the regal setting of a renaissance court. The implied behaviour at such a court was noble, aristocratic, deferential and above all, sensitive to others. Knights in shining armour surrounded by fair damsels at jousting tournaments! There is a story told in "The Little Flowers of St Francis" of Francis meeting a certain merchant of Cortona, who washed the feet of Francis and his companions, caused a great fire to be lit to warm them all, served a sumptuous meal to them and offered them all a cloak when they went out into the cold. Francis said of him, "I tell you I have rarely seen so courteous a man, and nothing would please me more than to have him as a friar. He is grateful to God for his blessing, generous to the poor, and most courteous to all." This man from Cortona did indeed join the friars and lived the rest of his life at the friary in Cortona.

For all of us at Padua, courtesy can be exemplified in a very simple way - calling people by their name, speaking quietly and gently to others, never putting others down, never using one's authority in a domineering fashion, and always trying to make others comfortable in our presence. St Bonaventure advised educators in the Order, that they should treat their students as mothers do to their children, and not as masters; loved rather than feared. And that there can never be any harm done to a student by showing maternal indulgence.

Courtesy then must colour all the relationships we have with others - with students, teachers, staff and parents. For as Francis said, God makes the sun to shine on all, the saint and the sinner. And courtesy is truly the sister of charity, for it extinguishes hatred and maintains love for all.

## From the Pastoral Care Team



As parents, we often see ourselves as the protectors of our family, those in charge of teaching our students, readying them for life and ensuring we offer support and safety. Our end goal is to produce healthy, respectful young citizens with strong beliefs and values, ready to tackle the modern world.

Yet a 'full protection mode' of parenting may not necessarily be the best way of preparing our children to encounter life's challenges. Every child needs to be challenged, taken out of their comfort zone and at times, made to feel uncomfortable. This notion of raising the bar of expectation may take the form of opportunities like;

- 30 minutes of extra study per night, for a month;
- giving up a personal possession for a period of time;
- sacrificing leisure time to help out around the house;
- trying new food;
- attempting a new activity.

Raising expectations for your child through new experiences allows them to do a little more than they used to and achieve a little more than they have previously.

At Padua, the students are provided many opportunities to step outside of their comfort zone and challenge themselves to personally grow. Two weeks ago it was the Year 10 camp, last week my congratulations go to both the Cross-Country Team and the Cross-Country supporters for their extra commitment. This week it will be the boy who chose to complete extra study while on Exhibition break and the year 12 gent who was brave enough to have the first dance with his partner at the formal. All of these are important components of a young man's development and formation.

### **Odoric House and Boyd-Boland House Eucharist Date Claimers**





## Teaching and Learning



### Learning Nest – Students in Years 7 to 12

Is your son taking advantage of the Learning Nest? The Learning Nest is open every afternoon in the Assisi Library from 3:00pm to 5:00pm for students in Years 7 to 12 and is supported by Old Boy tutors and a staff member. This a great

opportunity for students to work collaboratively with their friends in a supported environment. If your son has more time on assignments or more study time as part of his Semester 2 subject goals, then The Learning Nest should be one of his strategies for meeting those goals.

### Goal Setting and Reflection

Each Semester, students are supported by their PC teachers to complete a reflection on the previous Semester or Term and then set specific subject goals for the upcoming Semester. As part of the Parent Student Teacher process, these goals will have been discussed with your son. If you have not seen your son's Semester 2 subject goals, please ask him to share them with you. A discussion around how he plans to meet those goals and regular check ins on those goals is a great way that parents can support and encourage the learning growth and learning habits of their sons.



### Study Tip

When setting subject goals, a lot of students state that they are going to revise their work every night. A great way to do this is to write down the *Learning Goal* and *Success Criteria* of each lesson and revise those each night. The Learning Goal and Success Criteria make visible the specific learning intention of each lesson and outline to students how they know if they are successful in meeting that learning goal. If a student can meet the Learning Goals and Success Criteria for the lesson, then they move on. If they can't then they need further follow up.

### Year 11 into Year 12 Parent and Student Information Evenings – August 20

#### Non-OP Pathway

The Year 11 into Year 12 Non-OP Pathway Parent and Student Information Evening will take place on August 20 in La Cordelle. This is an important information session for Year 11 students in both the Vocational and Mixed Pathways and their families. This session runs from 6:00pm to 7:00pm and covers key information to help Year 11 students on a Non-OP Pathway transition into Year 12 and prepare for their final year of schooling. It is expected that all Year 11 students on a Non-OP Pathway will attend with at least one family member.

#### OP Pathway

The Year 11 into Year 12 OP Pathway Parent and Student Information Evening will take place on August 20 in La Cordelle. This is an important information session for Year 11 students

and their families on the OP Pathway. This session runs from 7:00pm to 8:30pm and covers key information to help Year 11 students on the OP Pathway transition into Year 12 and prepare for their final year of schooling. It is expected that all Year 11 students on the OP Pathway will attend with at least one family member.

### Year 9 SET Plan Week – Week 7

The College Calendar has the week beginning August 27 as Year 9 SET Plan Week. This week will begin with an information session in the evening on Monday August 27 and will culminate with opportunities for parents and students, who would like more support and guidance around beginning to think about their Senior Pathway options, to meet with a staff member. The Greccio Library is all abuzz with displays, Harry Potter Week celebrations and preparations for our annual Book Week Parade on Friday, August 24 at 8:30am. The Year 5 Gold Rush unit has melded beautifully with Book Week's Find Your Treasure theme, and there will be more Treasure Hunts to come.

The Year 9/10 and 11/12 Book Clubs will be meeting with the Mt Alvernia girls next week in the Assisi Library, to discuss their award-winning book selection.

Year 7s are well into their Legacies of Ancient Rome research tasks, using the Libguide, databases and the new EBSCO Discovery Search tool.

Year 7-10s have been visiting the Library for book talks and borrowing, and all Year levels are seeking support during Learning Nest and study lessons with their research tasks.



21st Century libraries have four branches to their core business:

- a physical space - different and more accessible from other spaces around the school, to work, read and research;
- the development of a love of literature and literacy - because we cannot create a literate society without easy access to and a love for great literature;
- information literacy - because more than ever, our global citizens need to understand how to access the Information process, critically analyse what they read

and develop their points of view, while acknowledging their sources;

- digital literacy - for understanding that everything we do online builds our digital footprint, as indelibly as a tattoo, only much more public.

To this end, Padua Library provides:

- spaces for quiet reading, silent study, board games, research and collaboration;
- collections of books and displays to entice every reader...and we are investigating whether 'genrefying' the fiction collections will support boys finding what they are looking for, with greater independence;
- Libguides of curated websites and access to reliable databases, easy to use referencing tools (SLASA Online Reference Generator) and variations on the Guided Enquiry Information Literacy Process for Junior, Middle and Senior years;
- and we look forward to continuing to work with classes on further developing all aspects of their digital literacy.

**Diane Ames** met her husband Matthew while they were both studying engineering at the University of Queensland. They have been married for 23 years and have four beautiful children, aged 8 to 14 years old.

Six years ago, Diane was confronted with the most difficult decision of her life. Her husband had been in hospital for three days when doctors explained that Matthew was going to die that night. The only option available to save his life was to amputate all four of his limbs and even then Matthew only had a 1% chance of surviving. Diane knew instantly that she wanted to save Matthew and that their lives would never be the same again.

Matthew spent nine months in hospital and has endured numerous operations since. Diane is going to share her reflections on what she has learnt from the experience, the impact it has had on the family and how she is able to enjoy every day.



**Juliette Wright** GIVIT Founder and CEO is an inspired and passionate social justice campaigner on a mission to help alleviate the effects of poverty across Australia. She started the free online donation platform givit.org.au in 2009 to better connect those who have with those who need.

In just eight years under Juliette's leadership, GIVIT has gone from a website with 15 charities using the service to an award-winning, crucial tool now working nationally with more than 2100 charities, government agencies and schools to manage the donation of more than 750,000 items to people in need.

Through Juliette's vision, hard work and determination GIVIT now provides an award winning Disaster Recovery Service to manage donation flow after disasters, including the Brisbane and Bundaberg Floods, the Ravenshoe Café Explosion, the Dreamworld tragedy and Tropical Cyclones Marcia, Ita and Debbie.

Juliette has received numerous awards for disaster recovery, business and innovation and was awarded Australia's Local Hero in 2015 by the National Australia Day Council.
