RSL Walk and Passing of George Palmer

It was great to see our boys and staff undertake the RSL Trek from the Gap to Woodford with the WW1 Challenge on the weekend. Thanks to Mr Sitarz and Mr Anderton, we have built up a good relationship with the Kedron Wavell RSL. This is the final year of the WWI Challenge where over the course of the five-year program, participants have carried a brick engraved with the name of a fallen World War 1 soldier across a 100km course. The bricks will be used to make a monument to the fallen soldiers as a reminder of the sacrifice made by so many young Australians.

In the week leading up to the walk, Fr Paul Rout informed me of the passing of George Palmer. George Palmer died last week at the age of 96. His funeral will be held at Little Flower Church on Friday 26th October at 11am. George was the father of Richard Palmer, Padua Old Boy and Senior of 1978. Richard played in the Padua Rugby League Firsts in the final of the Amco Shield that year, against Patrician Brothers Fairfield. While Richard's sporting deeds are noteworthy, even he would agree, that his father's story is one that transcends the gates of Padua and forms part of our national identity. George Palmer was a Digger in the Second World War and was on the original Kokoda Trail in New Guinea. His image is forever linked with Kokoda as he was one of six soldiers whose image was captured by war photographer Damien Parer. The image forms part of the Australian War Memorial Collection and overtime it has become one of the defining images of the Australian World War II campaign.

National Apology to the Victims of Institutional Abuse

If Scott Morrison achieves nothing else as Prime Minister, he will be well remembered for his heartfelt apology to the survivors and victims of child sexual abuse.

Mr Morrison told Parliament, "To the children we failed, sorry. To the parents whose trust was betrayed and who have struggled to pick up the pieces, sorry. To the whistle-blowers, who we did not listen to, sorry. To the spouses, partners, wives, husbands, children, who have dealt with the consequences of the abuse, cover-ups and obstruction, sorry. To generations past and present, sorry,"

Most distressing is that churches and other places where young people should have been safe, let so many families and children down. While our community is much more aware of the need for student protection processes, we need to be forever vigilant in the protection of children. Catholic Professional Standards Ltd (CPSL) was formed in response to the findings of the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse. It was established by the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference and Catholic Religious Australia. It operates independently from the Church and has a board of directors who are lay people with professional expertise in the fields of law, education, human services, safeguarding and regulation. Central to their work is the formulation of 10 Standards, providing the framework for Catholic Church entities to build child-safe cultures and to advance the safety of children and vulnerable adults across the Catholic Church in Australia. The apology also provides an opportunity for all in our community to reflect on the College's compliance requirements relating to the *Working with Children (Risk Management and Screening) Act 2000* (the Act). Under the Act, each school is required to have a *Child and Youth Risk Management Strategy*. This strategy is on our College website and it outlines the policies and process we have in place to ensure that students at Padua College are safe and protected from all forms of harm. I ask that you take the time to visit this document on our website.

The last of our Paduan values drawn from our Franciscan heritage is PEACE.

St. Francis of Assisi, widely known as "the instrument of peace", inspired the late Pope John Paul II back in 2002, to call together some 200 religious leaders from twelve of the world's religious leaders to Assisi, that together they could pray for peace in a world plagued by suffering, hatred and violence.

Francis having been involved in a war between the citizens of Assisi and Perugia, learnt firsthand of the terrible consequences of war. He spent much of his life drawing warring parties together in reconciliation and peace.

Italy, at the time of Francis was a battleground between the Holy Roman Germanic Empire, the Lombard League and the Papacy. As well, the cities of Italy were warring against each other. In this tumultuous time, Francis and his friars incessantly

preached peace, and always greeted the people with the words “may the Lord give you peace.”

The fraternity of early friars accepted all into their midst - be they nobles, peasants, the rising bourgeoisie, Guelph or Ghibelline. So those from different socio-economic milieus peacefully coexisted in a spirit of brotherly love.

Possessed of no goods or possessions, and with nothing to defend, the friars were ideally placed to preach peace, where a climate of hate existed. Whether it was Bologna, Assisi, or Perugia, Francis intervened to stop the violence in those towns, among the squabbling citizens.

Then in the summer of 1219 Francis arrived at Damietta. He came a year after the 5th Crusade had begun. His aim was to stop the wars by converting the Sultan Malik al Kamil. Taking a single companion with him, Francis made the most of a truce between the warring sides to approach the Sultan. He was treated kindly by the Sultan, who listened to him defend the Gospel. A stalemate occurred, and Francis returned to Italy, disappointed that there was no conversion - no end to the Crusade, and that he was not martyred!

We know that there can be no peace unless there is justice. Peace cannot be imposed, it must spring from the heart, where all people are treated with compassion, where we can stand in solidarity with others, respecting their unique dignity. And like Francis, reach out to the poor and vulnerable, knowing that hatred can only be overcome with compassion. It is dehumanising injustice that sows seeds of violence and hatred - and it is these things that become the fertile soil of inhumane terrorism.

Francis' practice of peace, justice, forgiveness, and prayer all converge for him in his embrace of the Cross of Jesus Christ, whose arms are outstretched, welcoming all into his community of poor self-giving disciples.

The Gospels are replete with references to the *compassion* of Jesus - his sensitive concern for those who are lost, for those who are sick, for those who are hungry, for those who have lost loved ones and for those who are in need. Then in the life of St. Francis and his early followers, we see their compassionate care for lepers.

Compassion is our response to those who, in one way or another, are suffering. The suffering can take many forms - it might be physical. It might be mental or emotional. It means we have a sensitivity to them, endeavouring to 'walk in their shoes.' It is about appreciating the difficulties and challenges certain people have to face - and in our generosity coming to their assistance - 'feeling' their pain and suffering. The compassionate person is no by-stander, no mere observer, but gets himself involved in a practical way to lessen the sufferings of others.

Dear Families of Padua

This month each year level has been rostered on to meet at the Marian Grotto, on the Parish Hall side of the church, to recite a decade of the Rosary before beginning their final class of the day. Praying the Rosary is an age-old Marian tradition of the Church designed to help reflect upon the events of the life of Jesus that also involved Mary. It is a meditation style of prayer – a prayer made popular in recent times by a number of Eastern religions like Buddhism. St Francis had a strong devotion to Mary and we continue that tradition in 2018 at Kedron and Padua.

The prayer has three parts:

1. “Hail Mary full of Grace, the Lord is with you.
Blessed are you among women . . .”
These words refer to those used by the Angel Gabriel when addressing Mary when announcing to her that she would carry a special child during her pregnancy.
2. “. . . blessed is the fruit of your womb, Jesus, . . .”
Elizabeth, Mary’s cousin, greeted Mary with these words when they meet just prior to Elizabeth’s own unique birth to a son who became known as John the Baptist.
3. Holy Mary Mother of God,

Teaching and Learning



College Teaching and Learning Expectations

As exam and assessment creeps up on us, I would like to remind families of where to access information regarding the Teaching and Learning expectations and processes that your son's and teaching staff are expected to comply with. The Frequently

Asked Questions (FAQ's) page is available via My.Padua in the Teaching and Learning Tile. It can also currently be accessed via the Teaching and Learning section of the College website. This document answers most questions that parents will have regarding assessment dates, non-submission processes, absenteeism on an exam date and much more. The key to navigating assessment time is always communication and you are always encouraged to contact your son's teacher at any time, should you need to. Email is the best mechanism for contacting teachers and all email addresses at Padua follow the same formula – initial of the teacher's first name followed by their surname and then @padua.qld.edu.au. For example, my email address is jpacey@padua.qld.edu.au

Term 4 Exam Blocks

Please be reminded that assessment dates, including exams, are scheduled during the calendar listed term dates. At the end of the year, most students will be completing assessment in the last week of term and very possibly up to and including Friday November 30. Therefore, I ask that you take this into consideration before planning for an early finish to the school year, as missed assessment may result in your son being awarded an Incomplete on his report instead of a grade. External Exam Blocks are scheduled for Years 10, 11 and 12, and Internal Exam Blocks are scheduled for Years 7, 8 and 9. Exam Block Timetables will be published via My.Padua later this term. For assessment dates that fall outside of the Exam Blocks, please refer to your son's My.Padua Due Work Calendar.

- Year 12 (External) – Monday 5/11 to Tuesday 13/11
- Year 11 (External) – Friday 23/11 to Friday 30/11
- Year 10 (External) – Monday 26/11 to Friday 30/11
- Years 7-9 (Internal) – Tuesday 27/11 to Thursday 29/11 (Common exam times will be allocated around normal lessons)
- Years 5 & 6 – No formal exam block will be allocated – Students will sit exams and submit assessment as stipulated by the teacher – The My.Padua Due Work Calendar will outline due work dates.
- For **External Exam Blocks**, students are only expected to be at school when they have an exam.
- For **Internal Exam Blocks**, students are expected at school for the entirety of each school day including morning and afternoon Pastoral Care class.
- **Please note: Should you make the decision to remove your son from school in the last week of term, he will miss assessment.**

Term Time Absences

I would ask families who are planning to take term time absence this term or anytime in Term 4, to complete the Planned Student Absence Term Time Notification Form by going to My.Padua, then MiClass and then selecting Available eForms. This form will inform you of the process and serves as part of the process of informing staff of your son's upcoming absence. However, there is still an expectation that your son will inform each of his teachers so that arrangements can be made where possible. It is important for families to be aware that in some cases, particularly exams in exam block, missed assessment will result in an incomplete (INC) being awarded on the report card.

Please note that many subjects assess in the last week of Term 4 and therefore a decision to remove your son from school early in that week will mean missed assessment.

Assessment Calendar – Due Work

At this time of year, parents often ask how they can view what assessment their son has. You can view your son's assessment by going into My.Padua and clicking on the Due Work Icon under his name. This will then show a calendar of your son's due work and assessment.



Supporting Student Learning in Years 7 to 12


A common question that parents often ask is what support Padua offers for students in Years 7 to 12. The boys are well aware that our Assisi Library is open from 7:25am every morning and at breaks, and the Learning Nest is open in the Assisi Library every afternoon from 3:00pm to 5:00pm. As part of developing a good learning culture, all students in Years 7 to 12 are encouraged to access the Learning Nest and the College Library. The Learning Nest is staffed by Old Boy tutors and students have access to quiet and group working spaces when utilising the Assisi Library.

Supporting Your Son with His Learning

At this time of year, we often experience students who need support in subjects and don't know how to seek that support. Simple steps in supporting your son to develop his own self-learning skills are:

1. MY.PADUA– Ask him if he has checked for a learning resource, task sheet or revision sheet on My.Padua. If not, send him there.
2. EMAILS – Ask him if he has checked his email communication from teachers.
3. CLASS NOTES – Ask him if he has checked his class notes and reviewed the Learning Goals and Success Criteria set in each lesson.
4. PEERS – Ask him if he has communicated with his peers.
5. TEACHER – Ask him if he has communicated with his teacher.

This is a sequential list with a deliberate order designed to support the College's Learning Framework and support your son in developing self-help skills that will support him both now and into the future to become a Good Man of Padua.

Semester 2 Academic Reports will be made available to parents in the week commencing December 3 via My.Padua/MiClass.



Digital Integrations

Departing Year 12 Students

As our Year 12s come closer to the end of their formal schooling at Padua, they will have the opportunity to book a time with our IT Help Desk to return their devices to factory settings. This enables them to use the device as a personal device without any of the 'Padua' settings.

As part of this, access to software licenced to and provided by the College, will also be removed from the device. Please be aware that your son will retain access to his Office 365 account for a period of 30 days. It is recommended during this time that any files, contacts or emails are transferred to a personal account of some description. If your son is intending on tertiary study, be aware that he will receive an account (most likely Office 365) through the tertiary providers. You may wish to investigate this before purchasing a home licence.

This information will also be presented to students before their final day of lessons this term. If you have a son in another year level who is leaving the College at the end of this year, the process will be the same. Forms will be available from the College IT Help Desk or can be printed from the copy below.

Upcoming improvements to My.Padua

From the beginning of the 2019 school year, there will some improvement to the news area of My.Padua. This will enable users to see all news items from the Dashboard (home page). This includes news that is more specific to you and your son/s.

Information will be made available online through My.Padua in the new year and will also be presented at Parent Information Sessions in 2019.

Research findings – Office of eSafety Commissioner

I regularly include information about supporting our young people in navigating the online world and supporting parents to navigate this often-unfamiliar landscape. The Office of the eSafety Commissioner released a report in May this year titled: State of Play – Youth, Kids and Digital Dangers.

The report examined how young people (8 – 17) deal with challenges in the online world. From this report, the top 5 negative experiences identified included:

- being contacted by strangers / someone they did not know
- being left out by others
- having mean things said about them/ name calling
- receiving repeated unwanted online messages
- having lies/rumours spread about them.

From these negative experiences, young people were able to better identify online risks; greater awareness of who their real friends were; balance online time better; developed greater understanding of their own online behaviour and more able to overcome problems they experienced online.

While no parent wants to see their child go through the negative experiences (online or otherwise), it is important to talk about strategies and emphasise ways that our young people can take action. These can be categorised into the following areas:

Self-help – most commonly blocking the offending account

Formal networks – reporting the offending behaviour to social media companies, schools or the Police

Informal networks – talking to parents, friends or other relatives about the offending behaviour.
